

A Checklist for Finding and Keeping a Trustworthy Sitter

- Start by asking people you know with children around the same age as your children who they trust and hire.
- Do you belong to a community organization or church? Ask if their volunteers or Sunday school teachers have expressed interest in babysitting.
- Don't forget your child's preschool. Let the director know you are looking for a sitter and to pass the word to her staff.
- Neighbors can be a great resource. If you don't know many of your neighbors, ask a well-connected neighbor to ask around for you (typically this is right up their alley of neighborhood involvement).

Once you find a sitter, what's next?

- Do your research. Check references and the sitter's training and certifications (Babysitting classes attended, CPR certification, First Aid training)
- Is this sitter a right match for you and your children? This is a parent's intuition based on her overall disposition and how she interacts with your children during your first visit. (Evaluate: Maturity, Punctuality, Decision Making, Personality, Responsibility, and Organization)
- Start with a short engagement, a few hours while you are nearby or stay home.
- Communicate your expectations and rules don't hesitate to leave a list:)
- Give her the tools to do a good job Clean House, Necessary Supplies Stocked, Food/drinks/bottles/sippy cups ready to go.
